Professor Dubin teaches clinical and traditional classroom courses, including a course in Social Security Law, and directs one of the country's oldest and most extensive "live-client" clinical programs. Within the Civil Justice Clinic, among other work he handles social security cases, including co-counseling the successful appeal and drafting the principal brief in a Social Security disability case before the U.S. Supreme Court in Sims v. Apfel (2000). Dubin also successfully litigated and argued Sykes v. Apfel in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit which produced a rare SSA "Acquiescence Ruling," agreeing to change policy and apply the Sykes case to thousands of disability claimants within the Third Circuit region each year.
