Ethical Issues in Electronic Discovery, Social Media and the Cloud

Electronic discovery, social media and the Cloud have each brought with them new challenges involving such wide-ranging issues as attorney competence, client communications, and storage, search and production of vast amounts of electronically stored information (“ESI”), to name but a few. This two-hour session will explore some of the complex ethical questions that can arise when attorneys seek to communicate, advertise or investigate facts using these new technologies, and when ESI is collected, searched and used as evidence in litigation.

Hon. Ronald J. Hedges (ret.), of counsel to Corodemus & Corodemus and principal of Ronald J. Hedges, LLC, has extensive experience in e-discovery, managing complex litigation, has served as a special master, arbitrator and mediator. He served as United States Magistrate Judge in the U. S. District Court for the District of New Jersey from 1986 to 2007. He is currently an adjunct faculty member at Georgetown University Law Center and Rutgers School of Law–Newark and serves on the Sedona Conference Advisory Board, the Sedona Conference Working Group on Protective Orders, Confidentiality, and Public Access, and the Sedona Conference Working Group on Best Practices for Electronic Document Retention & Production. He is also a member of the advisory board of the Advanced E-Discovery Institute of Georgetown University Law Center.

Maura Grossman, Esq., counsel at Wachtell, Lipton, Rosen & Katz, focuses primarily on legal, technical, and strategic issues involving electronic discovery and information management, both domestically and abroad. Ms. Grossman is involved in training federal and state court judges on e-discovery, and has served as a court-appointed e-discovery expert and mediator. She serves as co-chair of the E-Discovery Working Group advising the New York State Unified Court System, as a member of the Discovery Subcommittee of the Attorney Advisory Group to the Judicial Improvements Committee of the U. S. District Court for the Southern District of New York, and serves on the Sedona Conference Committees involving Best Practices for Electronic Document Retention and Production and on International Electronic Information Management, Discovery, and Disclosure as well as a coordinator of the Legal Track of the National Institute of Standards and Technology’s Text Retrieval Conference (“TREC”). She teaches as an adjunct faculty member at Columbia Law School and Rutgers School of Law–Newark.
