Professor Natsu Saito Taylor builds on the premise that racialized disparities continue to persist in the United States and are unlikely to be effectively alleviated by the Constitution's guarantee of equal protection. Her book talk provides a functional analysis linking disparate forms of oppression and makes the case that structural racism will be more effectively dismantled by contesting the ongoing settler colonization of these lands and supporting the right of all peoples to self-determination.

CLE INFORMATION

Rutgers Law School is an approved New Jersey and Pennsylvania continuing legal education provider. In addition, this program qualifies for New York CLE credit pursuant to the Approved Jurisdiction policy.

NJ CLE Information: This program has been approved by the Board on Continuing Legal Education of the Supreme Court of New Jersey for 1.2 hours of total CLE credit. Of these, 1.2 qualify as hours of credit for diversity, inclusion, and elimination of bias.

NY CLE Information: This program qualifies for New York CLE credit pursuant to the [Approved Jurisdiction Policy](#). This non-transitional continuing legal education program qualifies for a maximum of 1.0 credit hours (based on a 50-minute hour), of which 1.0 credit hours can be applied toward Diversity, Inclusion, and Elimination of Bias.
